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# Did You Know That

After having manufactured more than six million of them since 1951, the Merrimack Valley Works recently phased out production of the 1509B inductor, used in telephone carrier systems to help convert voice signals to higher frequency carrier signals. The 1509B has been replaced by a more economical inductor developed by BTL and WE engineers. Though smaller than a golf ball, the 1509B inductor contained fourteen separate parts, plus ten feet of wire.


