With their parents in attendance, the youngsters were presented their awards at a meeting at the North Andover Plant by Lee R. McClary, Director of Merchandise and Manufacturing Services.

Mr. McLeavey, of Hampton, N.H., is enrolled at Swarthmore College, while Mr. Bisbee, a graduate of Andover High School, has been accepted at Bowdoin.

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

Megabits
Giant Step To
Boost T-1 Carrier
Potential

T-1 Carrier—one of Merrimack Valley's hottest jobs, soon due to expand its floor space—is slated to become even bigger in the Bell System because of "megabits," which have to do with data transmission.

A "megabit" is one million bits of information per second; it means transmittal of the U.S. Constitution in about a wink's time, thus helping businessmen send more data in shorter time, improving service and cutting computer holding time.

BTL's Data Communications Laboratory has nearly doubled the capacity of ordinary telephone lines to carry data by developing the 203 Data Set, which boosts top speed on the regular dialed phone network to 3,600 bits per second.

<u>In development now:</u> a new data service operating at 1,344,000 bits per second—1.3 megabits; part of a BTL effort to make efficient use of the T-1 Carrier for data.

In the planning stages: a system operating at 6,000,000 bits per second. <u>In the future</u>: digital systems able to transmit up to 600-million bits per second, equivalent to sending the Manhattan telephone directory in a single breath space.

Telephone Service Cores Cut Costs, Boost Service

Telephone Service Cores—small, handy rooms conveniently located throughout the office areas, are now being constructed and equipped at Merrimack Valley; electrical and communications equipment is currently being installed.

These Telephone Service Cores, or telephone apparatus rooms, are being set up as various departmental moves are made in conjunction with occupation of the office building expansion. They'll house connection equipment, some of which was previously located adjacent to desks with multiple-connection phones, as well as other telephone apparatus.

Advantages: improved service, easier repairs, reduced extensive cable run-arounds, and cut cost; also increased office space by centralizing apparatus in service cores.
