

# MVW 1969 United Giving Campaign Week of Sept. 15th



Phillip R. Sirois, Department 538, says:

Based on the theme "WE (Employees) Lend a Hand with United Giving," the 1969 Merrimack Valley Works-wide United Giving campaign will be held during the week of September 15. During the drive, employees will be contacted by volunteer solicitors urging new enrollments and increased contributions from those who have already enrolled.

Funds raised through the campaign will benefit United Fund agencies in the communities of the contributors' choice. Those employees whose home communities do not have a United Fund agency may wish to designate another community to receive their donations.

Sections and departments contributing pre-designated percentages of the goal will be awarded Fair Share or Grand Award presentations, or both, during the drive. Fair Share participants also will receive individual awards.

Daily progress of the campaign will be recorded on special charts throughout the Works and on a huge billboard opposite the North Andover Plant on Route 125.

This year's drive is being conducted under the direction of Gerald M. Fannon, Assistant Manager, with Joseph J.

# Kaleidoscope

In Hurricane's Wake, MVW Still Plays Role In Service Restoration Hurricane Camille's wrathful winds have blown their devasting course, but for MVW and other WE facilities the all-out effort to repair the havoc and restore service continues. MVW Merchandise has kept on the hop shipping desperately needed equipment to Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone, striving to clear up the situation in Virginia. Countless shop and office units at MVW have been involved since Killer Camille struck on August 17, raking the Mississippi Coast, then slamming north and east across Virginia.

MVW shipped N2 Carrier, N3 Carrier, Microwave, and associated equipment to the havoc area. To meet needs, some equipment was "cannibalized" to make other gear. Example: four 7-foot Microwave bays were used to build two 9-foot bays, specially designed to both receive and transmit signals.

On Short Interval Basis, MVW Rushed Equipment for Western White House President Nixon's Western White House at San Clemente, Calif., has a complex communications system in which MVW-made transmission equipment plays an important part. Meeting the requirements of such a big job added to the already heavy service demands on WE's various facilities. Normally a 15-week task, it was done in 5.

The President's communications web includes a Moscow "hot line," data and teletype facilities, special lines to the Autovon network, and lines with special security and pre-empt features, plus a back-up system for all communications and two switchboards.

A number of WE locations worked on the team supplying the required equipment. Working on the necessary short interval, MVW provided T1 Carrier, L Multiplex, N2 Carrier, and Wideband equipment. Some of this was in stock, but much was manufactured on an accelerated basis to meet the Presidential needs. All orders were on a rush basis, and all delivery dates were met.
