Massachusetts Offers Close-To-Home Vacation Variety

FISH FRY, July 17 at Gorton's Wharf in Gloucester. Fish and chips to celebrate the schooner races to Nova Scotia. Food served beginning at 4 p.m., dancing to 11 p.m.

HORSE SHOW, July 19 at the Tri-County Fairgrounds, Northampton. Show includes breed classes, pleasure riding, driving, and dressage. Begins at 8 a.m.

TANGLEWOOD, July through August. The Boston Symphony Orchestra plays outdoors in Lenox every weekend. Also, popular artists, midweek. For complete schedules contact the Festival Ticket Office at Tanglewood in Lenox.

STREET PROCESSIONS, weekends from mid July through August. European-style street processions are held in the 300 year old streets of Boston's North End. Held on Sunday afternoons in honor of patron saints, the processions attract huge crowds. Band concerts generally follow in the evenings.

RACE WEEK, the last weekend in July. A regatta held in Marblehead with over 500 craft in the running.

BICENTENNIAL EXHIBITION, August 1, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Quincy Market Building in Boston. This exhibit, entitled THE REVOLUTION: WHERE IT ALL BEGAN is the size one normally associates with a World's Fair.

PILGRIM PROGRESS, every Friday in August at 5 p.m. The town of Plymouth re-enacts the church processions and ceremonies of the original Pilgrim settlers.

YANKEE HOMECOMING, August 2 in Newburyport, is Coast Guard Day. The week is given over to a beauty contest,

tours of colonial homes, a ten mile road race, boat rides, auctions, and fashion shows. Call the Newburyport Chamber of Commerce for details.

SCHOONER RACE, Gloucester on August 9, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Schooners race a 15 mile course in view of many spectator vantage points along the shore.

PANCAKES, on August 16 in Quincy, all the pancakes you can eat for breakfast, only \$1.00. They will be served on a 1000 FOOT LONG TABLE in the middle of Hancock Street.

LIBERTY POLE DAY, August 17 in Northborough, the militia will raise and cap a liberty pole on the town common with ceremonies, contests, and games.

BAKER CLOTWORTHY RETIRES AFTER 40 YEARS WITH W.E. HARRY HEILIG BECOMES NEW MVW ENGINEERING DIRECTOR

C. Baker Clotworthy (left), Director of Engineering here at Merrimack Valley for over 10 years retired at the end of June and welcomed his successor, Harry Heilig.



After a forty-year Western Electric career including sixteen years as Director of Engineering, C. Baker Clotworthy, Jr. retired on June 30. His successor, Harry B. Heilig, who transferred from Corporate Headquarters, assumed his new position on July 1.

Mr. Clotworthy began his career in 1930 as an Inspector at the Baltimore Works. He left the company a year later to pursue his degree at John Hopkins University, and worked for a brief time for Bethlehem Steel. He returned to Western Electric in 1937.

During World War II, Mr. Clotworthy was a major in the Army Signal Corps. He returned to Western Electric in 1946, transferred to the Allentown Works, and in 1956 transferred to Merrimack Valley. He became the Director of Engineering in 1959. In addition to his engineering achievements, Mr. Clotworthy is a member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the Lawrence General Hospital and the Chairman of the hospital's

building committee.

Mr. Heilig began his Western Electric career in 1956 at the North Carolina Works. Before that he had studied at North Carolina State College, worked for the Firestone Tire and Rubber Company, and served as a captain in the U.S. Air Force in Guam.

Mr. Heilig worked at the Service Division's Pacific Regional Center in Sunnyvale, California, returned to North Carolina, and later moved to New York where he was, until this month, the company's Director of Engineering Planning Practices. Both Mr. Clotworthy and Mr. Heilig are graduates of the company's Management Training Program.

New Telephone System Debuts Here Sept. 2

Using a telephone here at Merrimack Valley will become a lot simpler and more convenient on September 2 when the Works installs a new Centrex II. The changeover to Centrex, an automated system which will replace the old mahogany trimmed manual switchboards, has been in the planning stages for several years and should eliminate most of the problems which people have had with our occasionally overworked equipment.

Centrex offers a variety of new services. For example, people calling you from outside the Works will be able to reach you directly by dialing 681 and your extension. In addition, there will be Direct Outward Dialing. Calls will be made by dialing "9" and then dialing the number you wish. Some phones will have the provision for direct dialing of toll calls.

In addition, Centrex will provide for incoming call transfers without involving an operator, operator controlled conference calls, adding an extra phone to a conversation, and several other services. All the details will be explained in training sessions which New England Telephone will conduct here between August 1 and 15. A coordinator in each department will schedule all those who have extensions for a training session. If you have no phone and have access to someone else's, see your supervisor for the details of the new system. But, please, wait until after he or she has had a chance to attend a training session.

Also, anyone who receives telephone calls from outside the Works should fill out cards available from the department coordinator. Prior to September 2, these cards will identify your new extension and explain the direct inward calling feature. Thus, your associates outside the company can dial you directly, without bothering the operator at the new, automated, non-mahogany-trimmed console.





New Benefits Take Effect This Month

New and improved company benefits became effective July 1 according to Benefit Service. The upgraded benefits include Blue Shield coverage, Family Contract coverage, EME, and Medicare B premiums.

Blue Shield Coverage

Under the present contract Blue Shield reimburses 80 percent of the usual and customary charges of physicians for surgery and medical care. Beginning July 1, 1975, reimbursement for such covered services increased to 90 percent. Other services which are now covered include charges for blood processing and emergency first aid performed in a doctor's office. The charges for a semi-private room, board and necessary services for up to 120 days during each hospital confinement will continue to be fully paid by your Blue Cross coverage.

Family Contract Coverage

Unmarried, dependent children between ages 19 and 23, who are full time students, can now be included under a family contract. If a child now on a sponsored contract meets the above qualifications, the sponsored contract may be cancelled and the child enrolled under the family plan for which the company pays. If a qualified dependent child is not covered by a sponsored contract, that child may also be enrolled under the family contract.

Students in a family can be covered under a family contract until they leave school or the end of the year the student reaches age 23, whichever comes first. Contact your authorized benefit delegates for enrollment information.

EME Benefits

For extraordinary expense periods ending on or after July 1, 1975, after covered expenses total \$5,000, reimbursement will be at 100 percent for the remainder of that expense period for all charges normally reimbursed at 80 percent. (This feature does not apply to non-hospital psychiatric care for which EME pays 50 percent, but expenses for such care do count in reaching the \$5,000 total).

For medical expense periods *beginning* on or after July 1, 1975, the two percent of annual pay "out of pocket"

deductible will be reduced to one percent. The maximum, deductible will be lowered from \$250 to \$150 and a \$25 minimum will be introduced.

Finally, the income limit for relatives who are Class II dependent eligibles under EME will be raised from \$2,400 to \$3,000.

Medicare B Premiums Reimbursed to Eligibles

Certain active employees and their dependents who pay Social Security Medicare B premiums will need to identify themselves to their Authorized Benefit Delegate to claim a new benefit effective July 1, 1975. After that date the company will reimburse eligible individuals for the Medicare B premiums they pay. (Medicare B is a supplementary medical insurance program which helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses, excluding hospital expenses.)

For active employees, the eligible groups include:

Spouses and dependent children who are receiving Disability Insurance Benefit (DIB). To qualify for Medicare, they must have been receiving DIB for 24 months.

Regular active employees, their spouses or dependent children who are disabled by chronic kidney disease and are receiving treatment (hemodialysis) or are in need of such treatment or renal transplant. Individuals must be in the fourth month of dialysis, a requirement of Medicare.

These persons were paying the \$6.70 monthly Medicare B premium, either as deductions from their monthly checks if they were receiving Social Security benefits, or directly. The reimbursement from the company will be paid quarterly.

These reimbursements are in addition to those currently being made by the company to retired employees and their spouses over age 65, and to active employees' spouses who have reached age 65.

Because there are no records to which the company has access in order to identify eligibles, it must rely on employees to identify themselves and their eligible dependents.

Booklets describing the company Benefit programs in greater detail will be distributed soon.

In order for the Benefits Department to make timely reimbursements, the company must know whether you or your eligible dependents are enrolled in Medicare Part B. Applications for reimbursement are available from the Benefits Department upon request.
