MV people at (and on the way to) the Olympics

In our last issue, we talked about how MV-made products were helping to bring the Olympics to the world. This time, we would like to tell you about some MV people and their roles in bringing the Olympics to the rest of us.

Bringing the Flame to Atlanta

Larry Fisher has been a runner for 20 years, but he never expected to be selected as an Olympic Torchbearer. On June 14, Larry carried the flame for 1 kilometer through Wilmington, VT. "The actual run only lasted for about five minutes, but then I was mobbed for about 30 minutes by people wanting autographs and photos!"

The Torch Relay began in Los Angeles on April 27 and traveled close to 15,000 miles to arrive in Atlanta for the Opening Ceremonies on July 19. Larry pointed out that relay members actually pass on the flame to each other and not the torch. "And the flame wasn't just carried by runners, it went by train, horseback, bicycle, motorcycle and paddleboat on its trip to Atlanta!"

Larry is a resident of Hampstead, NH, and works in Quality Engineering & Assurance.

MV is sending its own team to Atlanta, but don't look for these names in any sporting event programs. Shown above from left, Jim Roberts, Jason Woodbury, Bob Nolan and Mike Comei will be working behind the scenes, providing technical support for the telecommunications network Lucent designed and built for the Games.

Bob is Olympic technical support director for Lucent and will coordinate all technical support for the BellSouth network. As SONET Network engineers Mike, Bob and Jason will work 12-hour shifts as technical advisors to BellSouth. From their computer stations, they will assist in monitoring all 173 sites in the network.

Much of the high technology applied here will become the standard for future Olympic Games, and much of it was designed and built here at Merrimack Valley.
















Merrimack Valley employees stress the importance of education at home and through community activities.





Trails we can use

Imagine a level, straight, smoothly paved trail, with no automobile traffic — safe for kids as well as adults — to walk, run or ride bikes, rollerblades, wheelchairs or skateboards. A trail patrolled by police to keep unpleasant incidents to a minimum. A trail heading like an arrow into the heart of Boston, allowing hundreds of people to commute into the city every day.

This trail exists! It is the Minuteman Bike Trail, one of the most popular trails in the United States. It was created by recycling a longunused railroad train bed, previously a litter-filled eyesore in people's backyards.

Imagine the benefits of such a trail to your neighborhood: by using your bike to commute, you free up a car for your spouse and kids, you save money on gas, you'll shed a few pounds and increase your fitness, and you'll be outdoors, feeling the wind in your hair and smelling the roses as you pedal by.

Some of us are lucky enough to live near such a trail. In Massachusetts, there are nine converted railbeds, for a total of 116 miles. Another 41 trails are proposed or under construction (336 miles). In New Hampshire, there are 35 converted railbeds (130 miles), with 17 in process (331 miles).

If you are interested in learning where these trails exist, contact the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy (1-800-888-7747) for a copy of their booklet *40 Great Rail-Trails in New York and New England* (about \$15). You should also be able to find trail information and tour books at area bicycle shops.

There are two other trail networks that pass through the local area, that are under development, and need volunteer participation. They are the Merrimack River Trail and the Bay Circuit Trail. The Merrimack River Trail is planned to connect from Plum Island to the Appalachian Trail in NH, closely following the river. One section of the trail would run directly behind the MV plant. The Pioneer Environmental Committee is investigating ways to coordinate with the Merrimack River Watershed Council to forward work on this trail.

The Bay Circuit Trail starts with the Merrimack River Trail at Plum Island and circumnavigates the Boston Metropolitan Area in an arc between Routes 128 and 495, from Plum Island to Duxbury. The trail traverses about 50 communities, and is over half completed at this time. It passes through Newbury, Rowley, Ipswich, Boxford, North Andover and Andover in the local area. All of these towns have active trail committees and welcome new members. Contact can be made through the Bay Circuit Alliance in Andover at 470-1982.

Helping to establish and maintain their trails is a wonderful way to get outdoors and serve your local community by providing recreational opportunities and aiding in conserving and protecting valuable natural resources.

About 200 volunteers helped out as cooks, referees and one-on-ones. All and all, close to 1,000 friends and family members and volunteers made up the audience.





Team Trek

Have you noticed the tents set up in the ball field and beyond? ... seen groups of people out there looking like they're having too much fun to be working? ... wondered what's going on?

It's called Team Trek.

In 1992 bargaining, AT&T, CWA and IBEW agreed to cooperate in creating a Workplace of the Future (WPOF). Team Trek is part of the initial WPOF training process. It's a full day of outdoor experientialbased training made up of teambuilding exercises and activities.

Sessions are being led by facilitators Marylou Noonan (representing Local 1366), Larry Rizzotti (representing Local 1365) and Cathy Dallon-Archambault (representing the Company). They are spearheading the WPOF effort at MV, and a major part of this is implementing the Self Directed Work Team (SDWT) concept.

In very simple terms, a SDWT is a group of employees responsible for a whole product or process. They work together towards the common goal of satisfying customers by planning, performing, coordinating and improving their work.

on the team developmental progress. Once in place, the teams will run their process as if it were their own business, developing an entrepreneurial spirit in the workplace.

Team Trek training is important in developing the SDWT process at MV. Completing the program gives employees a new under-

standing of what it means to be a team player.

Larry, Cathy and Marylou plan to take advantage of the good weather and do as many Team Trek sessions as possible this summer. So far, over 500 employees are scheduled. Later this year, employees will be scheduled for an orientation of WPOF concepts and other indoor classroom training.

There is still much to be done to



get WOPF going at MV, but success of this process will mean a more competitive company, greater customer satisfaction and a better trained and satisfied workforce.
