

Bell Atlantic chooses Lucent

Bell Atlantic has selected Lucent under a five-year contract valued at more than \$200 million to supply equipment and software for the East Coast components and systems integration of Bell Atlantic's next-generation, data packet-switched long distance network. Construction is expected to begin in July on the network, which will provide



to begin in July on the network, which will provide the regional platform for data communications for customers across the Bell Atlantic region, the nation and the world. Bell Atlantic is Lucent's first customer for the data network solution, designed by Bell Labs, that integrates voice and data on a single platform.

Toll Reimbursement Extended

Active U.S.-based management and occupational employees will continue to be reimbursed for eligible toll calls and charges through Sept. 30, 1998, and should continue to use current reimbursement procedures. Effective Oct. 1, 1998, this program will be discontinued.

Employees will need to submit their final eligible calls and charges by Dec. 15, 1998, to be reimbursed for those calls. For individuals who retired on or after Jan. 1, 1984, the toll reimbursement program will be extended through Dec. 31, 1998. Those who retired prior to Jan. 1, 1984, are not affected. The toll reimbursement program was carried over to Lucent when the company spun off from AT&T.

NTT chooses Lucent

Lucent has been selected by Nippon Telephone and Telegraph (NTT) to provide passive optical networking technology for NTT's access network throughout Japan.

Lucent will provide Optical Network Units, which will be installed near or in homes, as well as Optical Line Terminals, which will be installed at NTT central offices.

Employees honored for volunteerism

Lucent was well represented at Business Expo '98, where the theme was "A Tribute to Valley Volunteers." John was honored for his work with the Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) Program, a nation-wide program that helps children in the juvenile court system. 
